For each city or country covered a specific outline is followed. If the material is limited in scope, the material is classified according to the major outline headings. In other words, the material is classified using Roman Numerals only and is not broken down in to sub-categories.

If the material on a city or county is extensive in scope, the entire outline is used. In other words, the material is classified using Roman Numerals, Capital letters, Arabic Numerals, and so forth.

In addition to the material included in the outline above, there is a large collection of miscellaneous material. These include financial reports, planning reports, school reports and other miscellaneous materials. These materials may be found in the folders immediately following the notebooks for a particular area.

The Elazar material covers nine metropolitan areas within the State of Illinois.

1) The Champaign-Urbana Area

The information on both Champaign and Urbana is quite extensive. Rantoul, Chanute Air Force Base, and the University of Illinois are included in this section. There is also a general section including a folder on Champaign-Urbana politics.

2) The Decatur Area

Decatur and Macon County are superficially covered in a single notebook. The information is somewhat limited for this area.

3) The East St. Louis Area

The City of Belleville is given ample coverage, but the rest of the area, including East St. Louis, Alton, Granite City, Madison County, and St. Clair County, is given superficial coverage.

4) The Joliet Area

This section contains some information about Joliet and Will Country. The material is quite limited in scope.

5) The Oak Park Area

This section contains one small notebook on the Village of Oak Park.

6) The Peoria Area

The information on the City of Peoria is extensive, while Peoria County and Tazewell County are also given ample material. Especially interesting is the large number of Tri-County Planning reports included in the miscellaneous folders.

7) The Quad City Area

The material contained in this section is, by far, the most extensive of the study. East Moline, Moline, Rock Island, and Davenport, Iowa are covered quite thoroughly. Milan, Silvia, Bettendorf, Iowa, Rock Island County, and Scott County, Iowa are also given ample coverage. The miscellaneous material includes financial and planning reports for Moline, Rock Island, and Davenport.

8) The Rockford Area

The City of Rockford is covered quite extensively. Winnebago County is also given ample coverage. Especially interesting is the large section on State House and Senate elections in Winnebago County.

9) The Springfield Area

The material on the City of Springfield is ample, however very little else is covered.

The Elazar material is located on shelves in the southwest room of the basement of the Institution of Government and Public Affairs. It is arranged by area in alphabetical order. In addition, each notebook or folder is numbered and labeled. The following is a list of the materials contained in the notebooks and folders.
